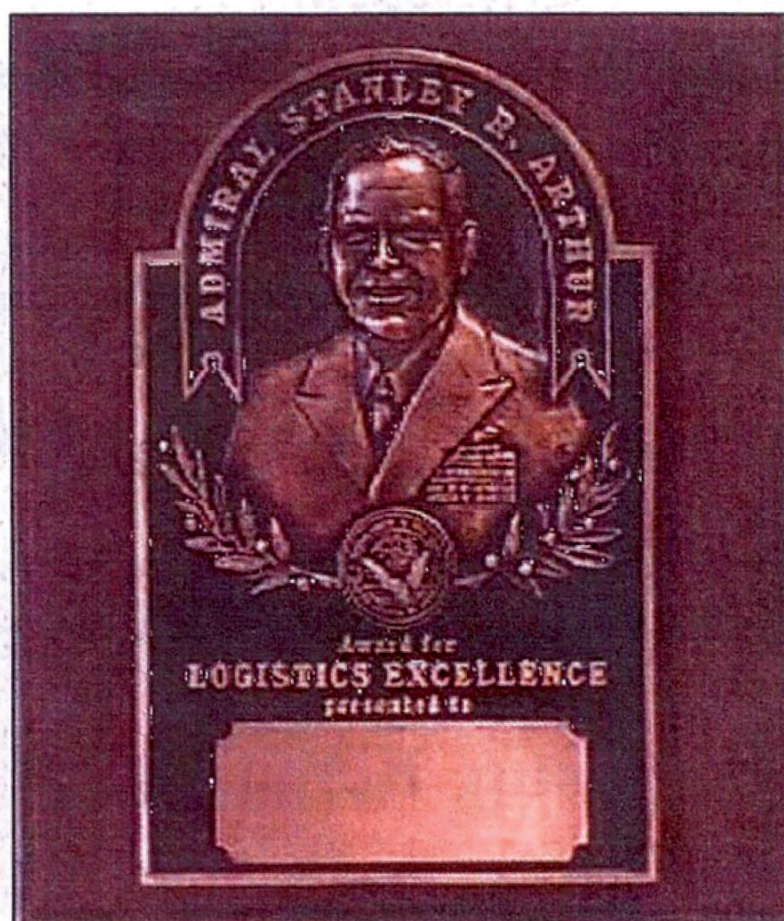

The Admiral Stanley Arthur Awards for Logistics Excellence

The Admiral Stanley Arthur Awards for Logistics Excellence are bestowed annually to individuals and teams who epitomize logistics professionalism and excellence. Nominees may be involved in any or all phases of Navy logistics from early life-cycle planning to in-service logistics support. The contributions reflected in the award nominations must be in the calendar year for which the award is to be given. Echelon II commands, through which all nominations must be submitted, are encouraged to submit nominees for each of the three award categories (civilian, military, and teams).

Selection Criteria: To qualify, innovative methods and logistics professionalism must establish benchmarks and a model to measure the accomplishments of logisticians throughout the Navy. Individual and team suggestions must demonstrate substantial tangible or intangible benefits. Specifically, candidates are judged upon the following:

1. Contributions and recommendations which advance logistics technology, products, services, and processes.
2. Contributions that resolve major logistics issues that result in substantial tangible or intangible benefits.
3. Innovative logistics planning and execution that merits adoption for standard usage.

The Civilian and Military Logistician of the Year should be individuals who enhance logistics professionalism.

ADMIRAL STANLEY R. ARTHUR, US NAVY (RET.)

Admiral Stanley R. Arthur was born in San Diego, California. He entered the U.S. Navy through the Naval Reserve Officer Training Corps Program and was commissioned in June 1957. He became a Naval Aviator in 1958 and later completed over 500 combat missions in the A-4 Skyhawk. Admiral Arthur earned a Bachelor of Science degree in Aeronautical Engineering at the Naval Postgraduate School and a Master of Science degree in Administration from George Washington University.

During his distinguished career, Admiral Arthur served on the staff of the Commander in Chief, U.S. Pacific Fleet, Pearl Harbor; as Assistant Chief of Staff for Plans and Policy with additional duty as Commander, Rapid Deployment Naval Forces and U.S. Naval Forces Central Command; as Commander, Carrier Group SEVEN; as Director, Aviation Plans and Requirements Division (OP-50); and as Director, General Planning and Programming Division (OP-80). He was selected for the rank of Vice Admiral in February 1988 and assumed the duties as Deputy Chief of Naval Operations (Logistics).

On 1 December 1990, Admiral Arthur assumed duties as Commander U.S. SEVENTH Fleet and Commander, U.S. Naval Forces Central Command for Operations Desert Shield/Desert Storm. He directed the operations and tactical movements of more than 96,000 Navy and Marine Corps personnel and 130 U.S. Navy and Allied ships. This represented the largest U.S. naval armada amassed since World War II. Admiral Arthur assumed duties as the Vice Chief of Naval Operations on 6 July 1992. He retired from active military service on 1 June 1995.

VADM Michael K. Loose, CEC, USN Deputy Chief of Naval Operations for Fleet Readiness and Logistics

Vice Admiral Michael K. Loose became the Deputy Chief of Naval Operations for Fleet Readiness and Logistics in January 2007.

Vice Adm. Loose was born in Albuquerque, N.M. and raised as a Navy junior. He attended the University of Kansas on an NROTC scholarship. He earned his Bachelor of Science in Civil Engineering and was commissioned an Ensign in the Civil Engineer Corps in 1975. He earned his Masters of Science in Civil Engineering and completed the Integrative Program in Administration at the University of Washington in 1980. He completed the University of Michigan Executive Program in 1996.

His previous assignments include: Commander, Naval Facilities Engineering Command and Chief of Civil Engineers; Commander, NAVFAC Atlantic Division and Fleet Civil Engineer, Commander U.S. Atlantic Fleet; Vice Commander, Naval Facilities Engineering Command and Deputy Chief of Civil Engineers; Commanding Officer, Navy Public Works Center, Pearl Harbor, Hawaii and Commander Navy Region Hawaii Program Manager for Regional Facilities, Environmental, Safety and Passenger Transportation; Facilities Officer, Commander-in-Chief, U.S. Pacific Fleet; Commanding Officer, U.S. Naval Mobile Construction Battalion 40; Head, Base Operations Support Policy, Program, and Budget Branch for the Chief of Naval Operations; NAS Fallon Public Works Officer, and Officer in Charge of NAVFAC Contracts and Resident Officer in Charge of the Base Operating Support and Range Maintenance Contracts.

Other previous assignments include: Head, Acquisition Support Division, Northern Division, Naval Facilities Engineering Command; Operations Officer, 31st Naval Construction Regiment; Operations Officer and Plans, Training, and Intelligence Officer, U.S. Naval Mobile Construction Battalion 40; Assistant Officer in Charge of Construction for Management and Assistant Resident Officer in Charge, Industrial Facilities, OICC Trident; and Activity Civil Engineer at the Navy Public Works Center, Pearl Harbor, Hawaii.

Vice Adm. Loose is a Seabee Combat Warfare Officer. He is a registered Professional Civil Engineer in the state of California, a member of the Acquisition Professional Community and a Fellow in the Society of American Military Engineers. His personal decorations include the Distinguished Service Medal, the Legion of Merit (five awards), the Meritorious Service Medal (two awards), the Navy Commendation Medal (two awards), and the Navy Achievement Medal (two awards).

THE 2006 MILITARY LOGISTICIAN OF THE YEAR

LCDR DANIEL L. NORTON, SC, USN
CENTCOM / FISC SIGONELLA, ITALY

LCDR Norton's exceptional foresight and situational awareness were instrumental in the management and coordination of the intermodal transfer of 120 Army helicopters, 1,350 tons of cargo and 300 people. As command and control for this multi-mode transportation concept, he flawlessly directed the efforts of the Surface Deployment Distribution Command, 10th Mountain Division, 82nd Airborne Division, 5th Battalion of the 502nd Infantry, Military Sealift Command, 725th Air Mobility Squadron, Naval Facilities Rota and various elements of Naval Station Rota. His execution of this concept has made transportation of Army aviation brigade assets via sea and air a reality and has realized savings upwards of \$10 million per deployment.

THE 2006 CIVILIAN LOGISTICIAN OF THE YEAR

MRS. BEVERLY THOMAS

Mrs. Thomas streamlined processes used to manage the inventory of critical reparable components throughout the transportation pipeline. The cornerstone of Mrs. Thomas' strategy is the Electronic Retrograde Management system. This web-based tool enabled deployed operations at remote locations around the world to expeditiously prepare retrograde for shipment. The tool has provided flexibility to rapidly meet multiple requirements and capability to significantly reduce fleet workload. With initial rollout onboard the USS Abraham Lincoln, the system is now used to process 85 percent of all Naval retrograde, and achieved a cost savings of \$10.6 million. Other impressive results included a 30 percent reduction in average transit times, a 99 percent proof of delivery rate, and improved logistics support and workload reduction for the warfighter.

THE 2006 LOGISTICS TEAM OF THE YEAR

COMNAVCENT N4 COMBINED TASK FORCE FIVE NINE (CTF-59) NON-COMBATANT EVACUATION OPERATION (NEO) LEBANON LOGISTICS TEAM

The team supported the planning and execution of the swift evacuation of approximately 15,000 American citizens from Lebanon due to hostilities between Israel and Lebanese Hezbollah in July 2006. The team's efforts included a rapid build-up and deployment of 9 ships, 40 aircraft, more than 900 U.S. joint forces ashore on Cyprus, and 6,000 sailors and marines at sea in the eastern Mediterranean. Within twenty-four hours, members of the team stood up a forward logistics support site, where they established on-the-ground contingency contracting procedures and prepared the foundation for the follow-on movement of sustainment packages. Other team achievements included a Website development effort that allowed Stakeholder access to critical transportation and movement data. The team also sourced a significant portion of the humanitarian assistance and transportation requirements with the Coalition Forces Land Component Command (CFLCC). This joint solution drove the expeditious, in-theater release of humanitarian assistance items and health and comfort items to the evacuees within forty-eight hours of notification.
